The City Continued work on "Plan 200K", an initiative that looks forward to the City reaching a population of 200,000 while considering the impacts of different development and land use scenarios on GHG emissions. This initiative takes improvements into account with respect to building energy efficiencies, vehicle efficiencies, solid waste diversion rates, and currently planned transportation infrastructure. Further to community planning efforts, the City also enacted Step 1 of the BC Energy Step Code in Part 9 buildings.

Community-Wide Action #1

Completed construction on active transportation project (walking and cycling), and restructured the City's transit service to provide more service hours better reliability on the busiest routes. Concurrently, completed 20 crosswalk and bus stop upgrades to enhance walkability and transit access in the community.

Community-Wide Action #2

Continued delivering waste community clean up events with active participation of volunteer groups. Initiatives included: adopt-a-park, adopt-a-street, adopt-a-trail, and Community Clean Up week.





Community-Wide Action #3

Launched the Waterwise Portal for residents and business owners to view their water consumption online. Concurrently, the City continued to work with residents and business owners to identify and resolve water leaks. In 2019, 2,683 water leak notifications were processed (based on 10L/hr over 3 days) and approximately 1,281 final meter reads were sent.

Adaptation Action #1

Fraser Valley Adaptation Strategy – Climate Action Initiative (BC Agriculture and Food)

The Fraser Valley Adaptation Strategies planning process ("Plan") was initiated by the BC Agriculture and Food Climate Action Initiative (CAI). Strategies and actions that will enhance agriculture's ability to adapt to climate change are the focus of the plan. The planning process involved input from Fraser Valley Regional District, local governments, Ministry of Agriculture and a number of agricultural organizations. City of Abbotsford was part of the working group. The Plan was completed in March 2015 and the near-term priority actions are now being implemented. In 2019, the following projects were commissioned:

- Farm level Flood Mitigation, Preparedness and Recovery Toolkit
- Agricultural Water Supply Assessment
- State of Practices and Technologies Assessment for Management Extreme Heat Impacts

Adaptation Action #2

In June 2018, the City received funding for the "Nooksack River Overflow Flood Mitigation Plan" from the Provincial/Federal National Disaster Mitigation Program, to reduce the risks and impacts of flooding on Canadians. The project will use specialized software to estimate flood damage under a 100-year and 200-year event. The estimate will help the development of mitigation options to reduce the risk of flooding in the area, and enable further discussion with stakeholders in the United States related to cross-border flooding issues. The work was initiated in 2019, and will complete in 2020.

Section 3: 2019 Carbon Neutral Reporting

Local governments are required to report on their progress in achieving their corporate carbon neutral goal under the B.C. Climate Action Charter. Working with B.C. local governments, the joint Provincial-UBCM Green Communities Committee has established a common approach to determining corporate carbon neutrality for the purposes of the Charter, including a Carbon Neutral Framework and supporting guidance for local governments on how to become carbon neutral.

GREEN COMMUNITIES COMMITTEE CLIMATE ACTION RECOGNITION PROGRAM:

The joint Provincial-UBCM Green Communities Committee is pleased to be continuing the Climate Action Recognition Program again this year. This multi-level program provides the Green Communities Committee with an opportunity to review and publicly recognize the progress and achievements of each Climate Action Charter (Charter) signatory.
