Reducing Overdose, Abbotsford Response (ROAR)

Established to support and facilitate local partnerships, coordinate programs and services relating to substance use, address gaps, and plan for a collaborative, caring, creative community response to the overdose crisis caused by a toxic illicit drug supply.

Members include representatives of non-profit & faith based organizations, health authority, City of Abbotsford, pharmacy, law enforcement, Peers (people with lived or living experience with substance use) & family members.

Population Health Emergency

- Across Canada there have been 30,843 apparent opioid toxicity deaths between January 2016 and March 2022;
- •January-March 2022 there were **21 deaths per day**. In 2016 when the public health emergency was declared, there were **8 deaths per day**.

Accidental death due to drug poisoning has <u>decreased</u> the life expectancy of Canadians
