CE is currently in the process of hiring a Coordinated Access Specialist (should be in place by November 2022), who when hired will work on various components of Coordinated Access and Assessment (CAA) implementation including collaboration with Indigenous organizations. The DC CAB has broad representaion on it including local First Nation, and Metis organization that have been involved in all CAA related conversations.

With respect to the completion of the Community Homelessness Report (CHR), was there collaboration between local Indigenous and non-Indigenous organizations and, where applicable, the IH CE and/or Yes CAB? Describe when this collaboration occurred and what parts of the CHR were informed by these efforts. The CE continues to work with Indigenous community to ensure projects by/for Indigenous community members are included in the Reaching Home portfolio. One of the capital projects funded this past fiscal specifically will provide housing for Indigenous individuals and one of the service projects has a specific focus on serving homeless Indigenous individuals and placing them into housing with supports. Additionally, as the CAB is comprised of numerous demographics, including 1 local First Nation (Sumas First Nation), Metis representaion (Fraser Valley Metis Association), and 2 agencies led by and directly serving local First Nation and Metis people (Fraser Valley Aboriginal Children adn Family Services Society, Mamele'awt Qweesome Housing Society), collaboration has taken place on topics relating to the development of CAA and completion of the CHR.

Are there particular efforts and/or issues that you would like to highlight for this reporting period related to your community's work to achieve the Reaching Home minimum requirements?
As a reasonably new CE, we have been focused on delivering the grant portion of the RH program, including establishing the CAB, reporting, planning, and all other components of being a CE. We are currently in the interview phase for hiring a CAA Specialist with the CE who will oversee the development and implementation of a CAA system in Abbotsford. As a DC in BC, there have been challenges with information management (BC Housing HIFIS licensing and opportunities to work with RH funded communities), which has been a barrier to implementing a CAA system; these challenges are currently being worked out between provincial and federal governments.






Summary Comment for BC
