to champion volunteer opportunities for a wide range of residents and community groups which strengthen and support the City's business, arts and ..... culture economies.




**Volunteer Services supports** the Involve Symposium through organizing the event and supplying volunteers. Abbotsford leaders of Community Organizations, Amateur

# **FISCAL DISCIPLINE**

We actively manage our City .... finances with exceptional care. The City of Abbotsford currently has active 7.746 volunteers who have contributed approximately 78,179 volunteer hours in 2022. These volunteers contribute to added service levels that wouldn't otherwise be accomplished. The estimated value of the City of (EVVA) is \$1,954,475.00. This figure is developed by utilizing the total estimated volunteer hours contributed in 2022 (78,179) and multiplying this by an assigned hourly rate of pay (\$25/hour) for \$1,954,475.00 (\$25/hour

When equating volunteer hours to a full-time yearround job equivalent (FYJE) it would result in 40.7 **FTE's.** This figure is derived from taking the total number of volunteer hours (78,179) dividing it by 40 hours per week

The City of Abbotsford's total organization volunteer investment ratio (OVIR) is **9.34.** For every dollar the City of Abbotsford spends on the volunteer program it receives a return valued at \$9.34 in unpaid volunteer activity. This is a 9.3:1 ratio. This figure is derived from taking the total EVVA (\$1,954,475.00) and dividing this by the city's total financial investment in the volunteer

## **ORGANIZATIONAL ALIGNMENT**

We support the efficient and effective delivery of our City services and programs.







**Volunteer Services partnered with Abbotsford** Fire Rescue to develop the Extended **Emergency Support Service Volunteer (EESS) program.** This group provides support to the regular Emergency Support Services (ESS) team at Reception Centres when needed to assist our community in times of need. This assistance includes providing food, lodging, clothing, emotional support, and family reunification.



Cemetery Marker Maintenance; In conjunction with the Parks team and the Abbotsford Genealogical Society, Volunteer Services provides supplies and direction to assist with cleaning markers and headstones, debris removal, edging, and minor horticultural maintenance at City cemetery sites. This program has becoming increasingly popular and includes volunteer champions at all four city cemeteries: Aberdeen. Musslewhite, Mt. Lehman and Hazelwood.

## COMPLETE COMMUNITY

We value our community's connection with the environment through Park Beautifications, Stormdrain Troopers, Adopt a Park, Adopt a Trail, Adopt a Street and One Time Beautification

**programs.** These stewardship programs are vital as they provide educational opportunities, remove litter and debris, increase beautification of the community, promote the removal of invasive plants and see the introduction of native species within our park spaces. These green community initiatives and programs made up 65% of our volunteer force in 2022.1



### **RECEIVED TD TREE DAYS GRANT - \$10,725.25**



**Volunteer Services with the support of our** Parks Urban Forestry team applied for and received a \$10,725.25 TD Tree Days grant. On NSTALLED September 24th, 70 volunteers came out to McKay Creek Park to install over 800 trees in an area that

had been badly flood impacted in November 2022. Parks staff readied the site for the planting, ordered the plants and managed supplies. TD Tree Days is a program of TD Friends of the Environment Foundation (TD FEF), which the City of Abbotsford has participated in annually since 2014.

### **Our Community Clean-up** initiative was again expanded to include the entire month

of April. This is a great way for residents to get involved in volunteering, contribute to environmental stewardship in our community, encourage social responsibility, helps beautify our neighbourhoods and is a great way to celebrate Earth day, April 22nd. Last year over 4,000, residents participated in this beautification initiative. Abbotsford residents are encouraged to pick litter up around their workplace, school, parks, trails and streets from April 1 – 30th, 2022.

We support a multi-disciplinary approach to public safety by employing Crime Prevention •••• through Environmental Design (CPTED) principles. Volunteers engage in natural surveillance

as they become the eyes and ears of their communities by positively activating parks and neighbourhoods. Volunteers have a sense of community ownership of their space when helping to beautify it. Moreover, volunteers are maintaining and managing the beautification of their neighbourhood which is resulting in pride of place. This pride results in ownership and natural surveillance of a neighbourhood which leads to an effort to defend space. Given this, volunteers contribute to decreasing crime within communities.

Both participants and volunteers of our Live 5-2-1-0 Playbox program help with decreasing unfavorable activities in their communities through an **increase in park activation**. Live 5-2-1-0 Playboxes are industrial metal jobsite boxes that have been installed in local Parks that contain sport equipment and ideas for active play. The boxes are wrapped with colourful vinyl graphics and secured with combination locks; the code to open a Playbox is freely accessible to families. The 5-2-1-0 Playboxes program is supported by volunteer leaders with 3 Playboxes located in Eagle Mountain, Pepin Brook and McKinley Parks. This Playbox program which was created right here in the City of Abbotsford has served as a model for 17 other BC and 15 Ontario recreation and parks agencies.

### We embrace our cultural diversity as one of our greatest strengths.

An asset to our volunteer pool continues to be its cultural diversity. Our database mirrors the unique diversity of the Abbotsford community. 78% of our Volunteers indicate they are able to communicate in a language in addition to English. Some of these additional languages include; οΟ/λΟο Punjabi, Korean, German, French, Farsi,

and Mandarin.

**SNAP – Special Needs Access Volunteer Program** provides

opportunities to build social skills, confidence and meaningful volunteer opportunities for those with cognitively, physically or mentally diverse needs. SNAP Volunteers can assist with any of the multitude of program areas offered at our Recreation centers in conjunction with support, Recreation and Volunteer office staff. Customized volunteer activity plans for vetted

and approved volunteers.



We value recreation and support facilities, amenities and activities that connect

**us.** Recreation Volunteers support our programs by bringing in a fresh perspective as they begin work experience, fill a school requirement; or give back to their community. Summer, our busiest program season saw several new volunteers join staff to assist in aquatics, recreation, sport, art and day
