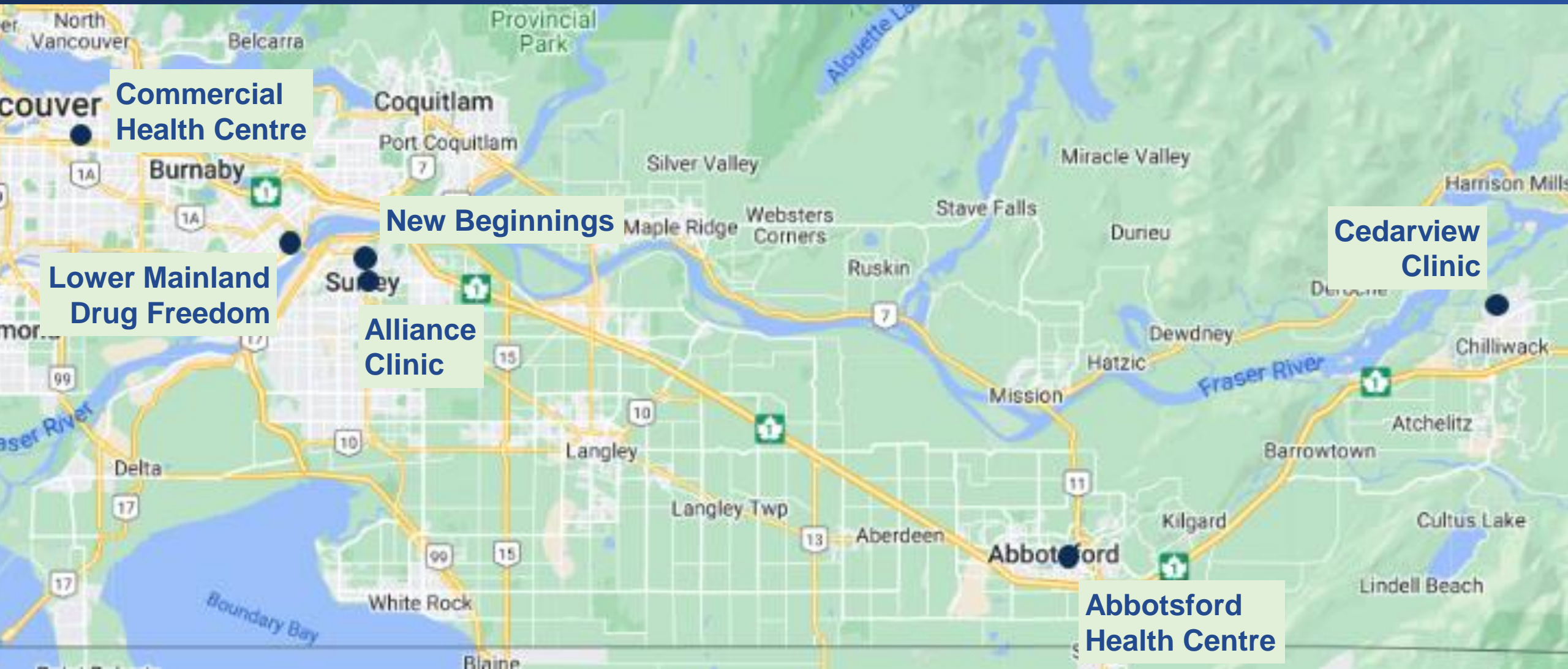

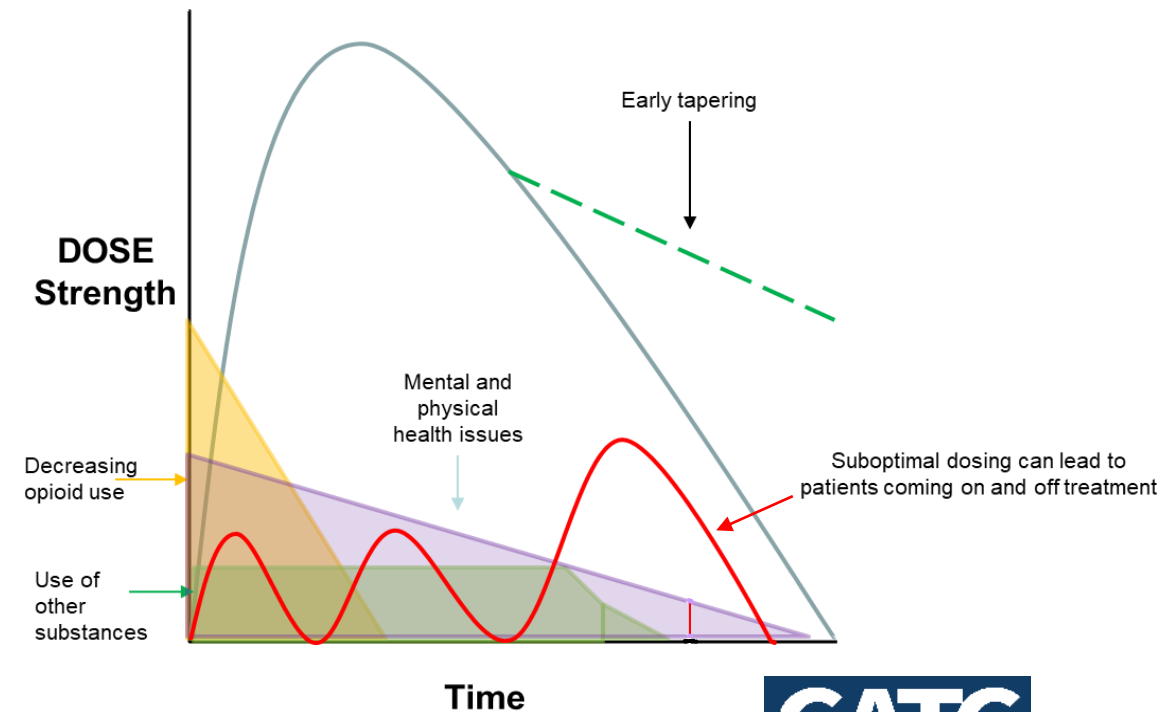
## Opioid Agonist Treatment (OAT)

- Methadone
- Buprenorphine (Suboxone® / Sublocade®)
- Slow release oral morphine (Kadian®)

# How do Methadone & Buprenorphine work?

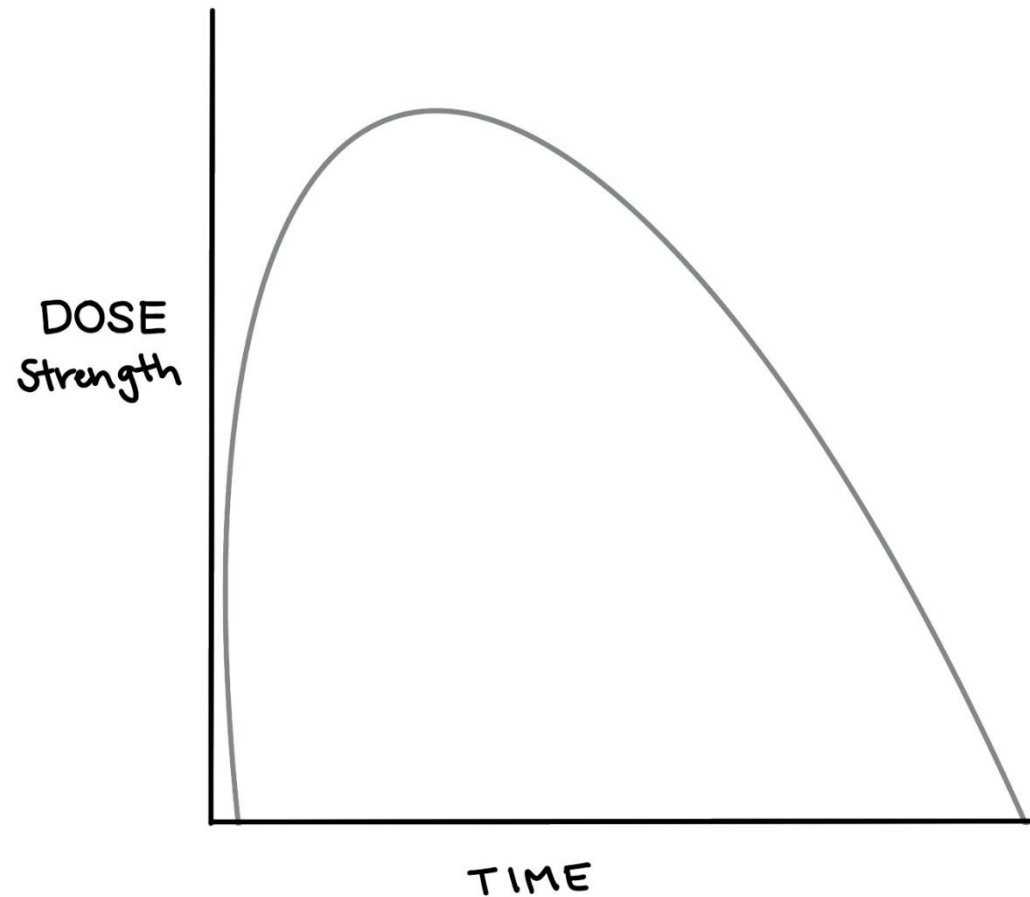
- Long lasting synthetic opioid medications
- Mitigate withdrawal symptoms
- Do not provide narcotic effects when used as part of an OAT Program
- Doses are gradually reduced
- Target goal for program completion is 2 to 3 years, but there is a lot of variability

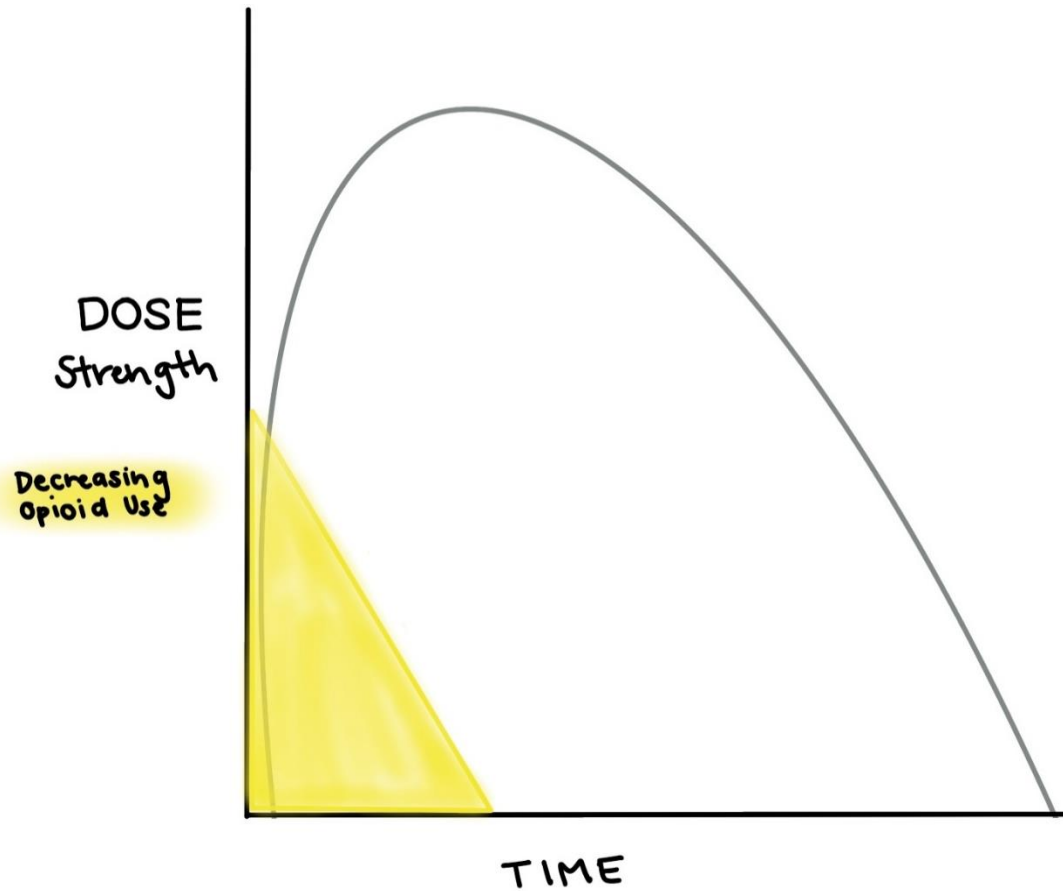




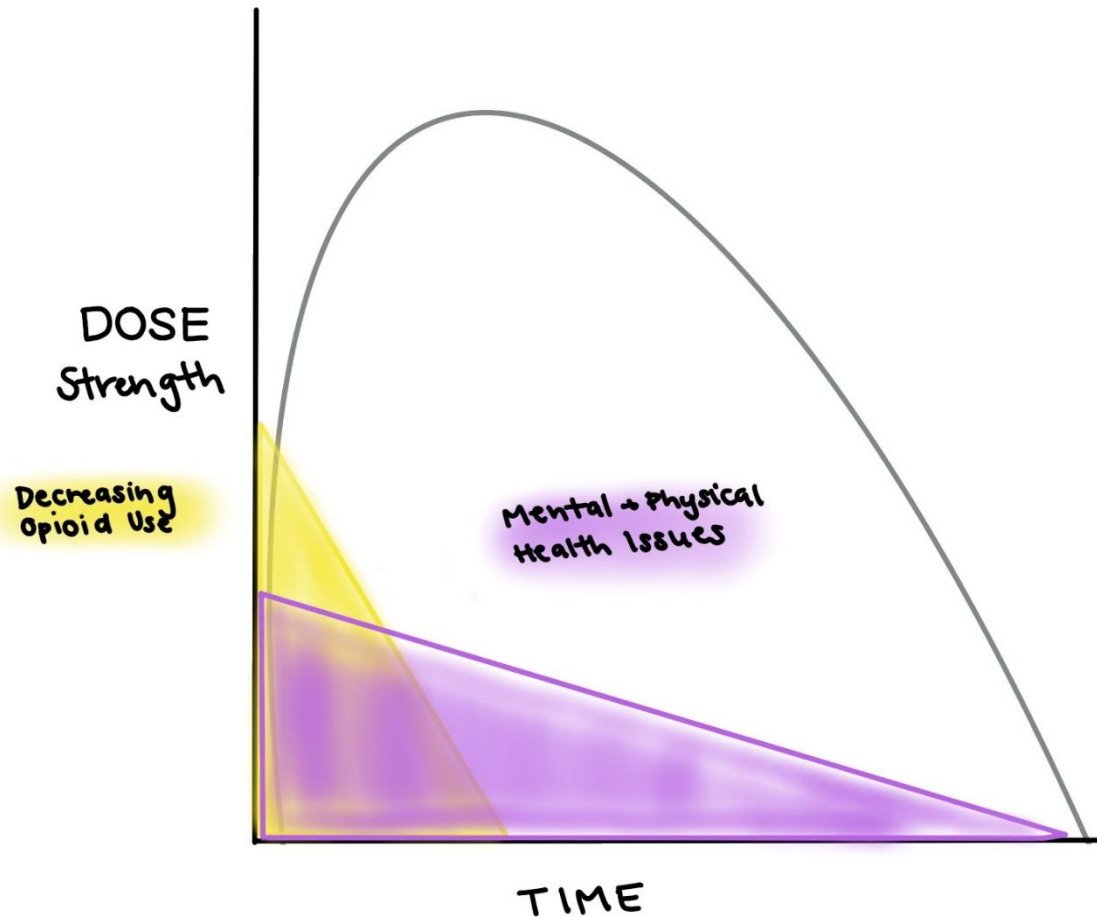
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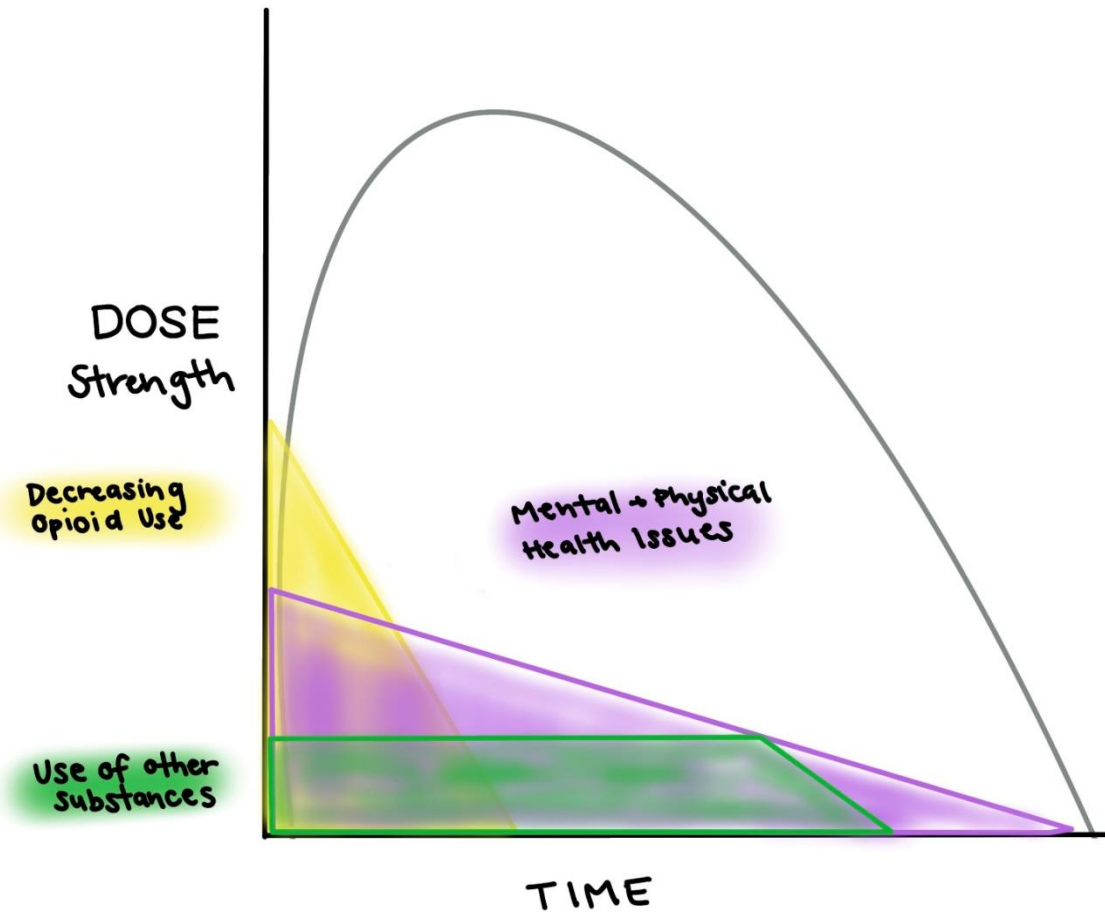


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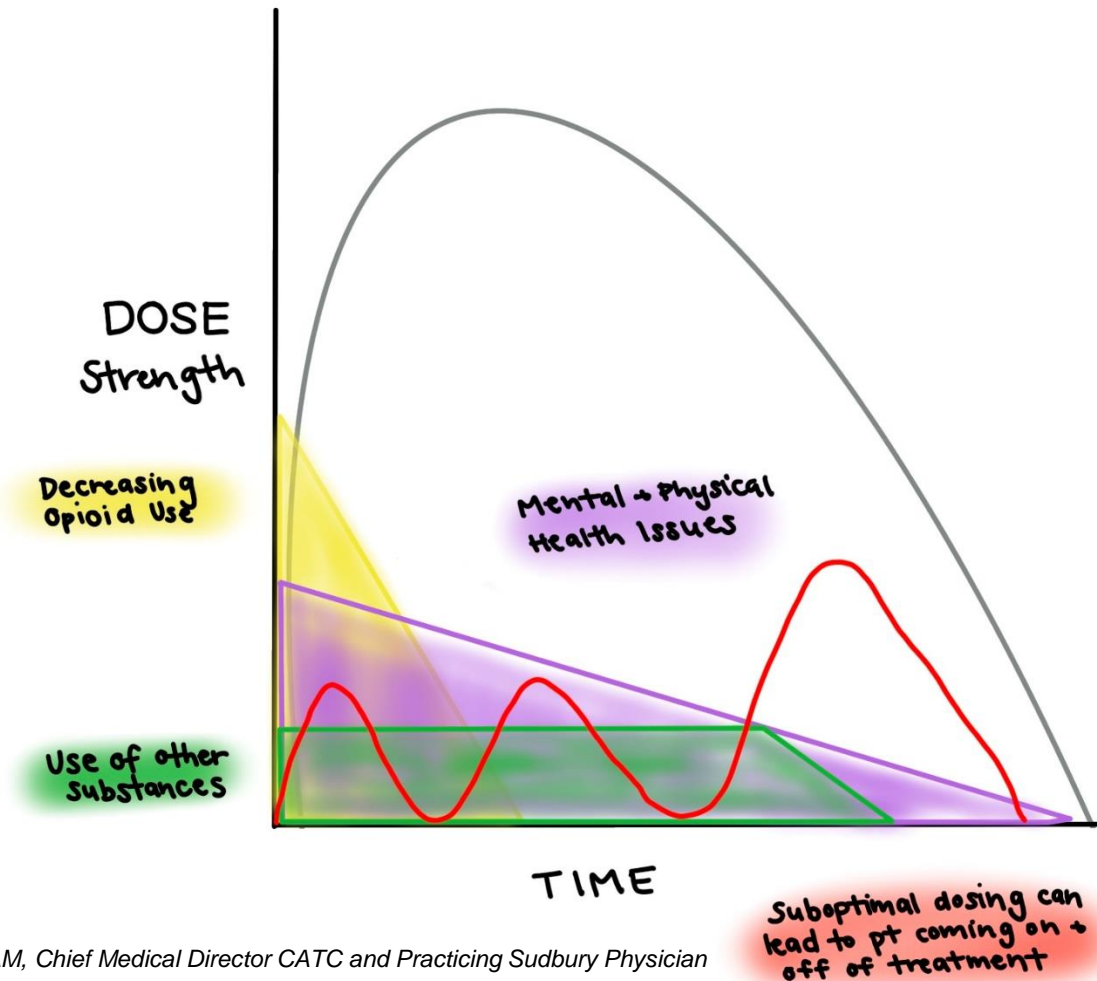




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# Patient Onboarding

The road to recovery isn't easy, but you don't have to do it alone



# The first 6 steps to recovery

1. Physician, community, or self-referral
2. Intake assessment with a counsellor
3. Initial appointment with physician
4. Individualized program: collaboration with physician
5. On-site urine analysis
6. Blood work requisition provided

# Funding

- Physicians bill MSP a fee-for-service model
- Pharmacies bill Pharmacare or insurance
  - Plan Z, Plan G
- MSD, FNHA, Corrections can fund clinic fees
- Reduced rate out of pocket
