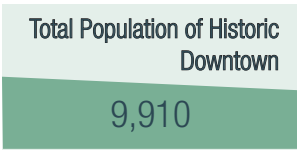

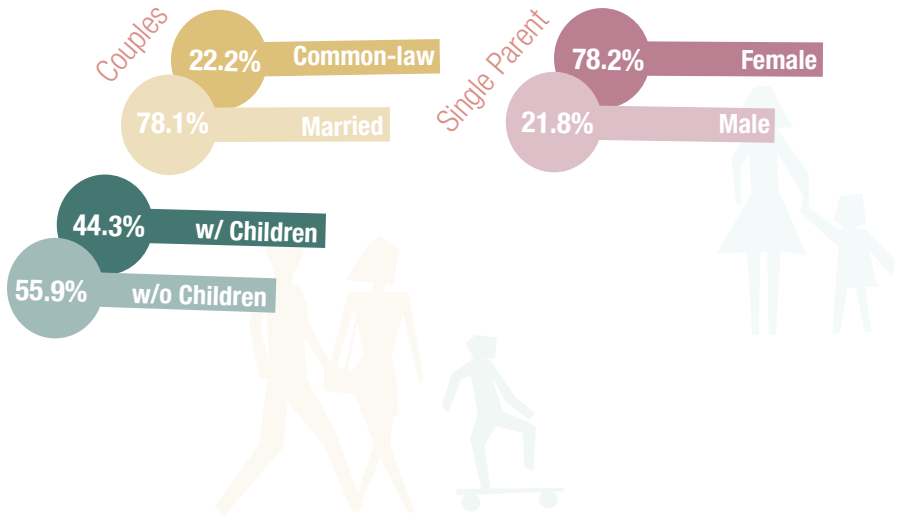

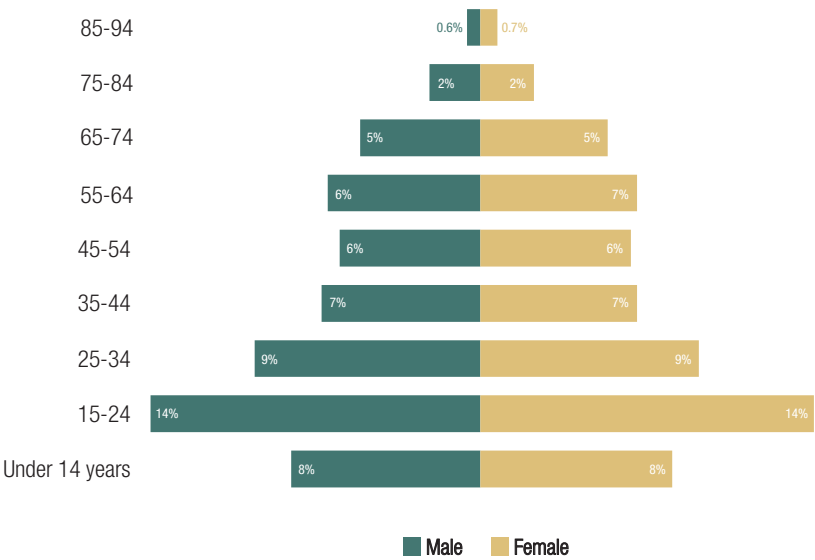

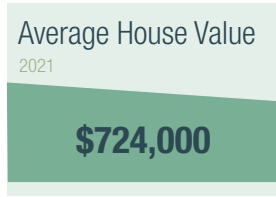
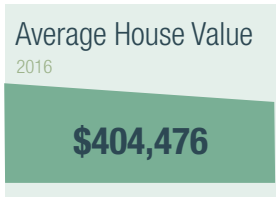
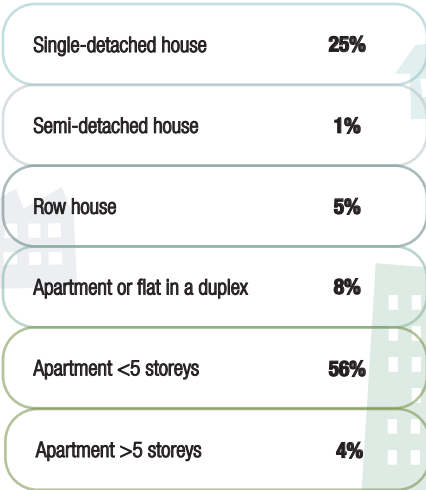
Family Structure



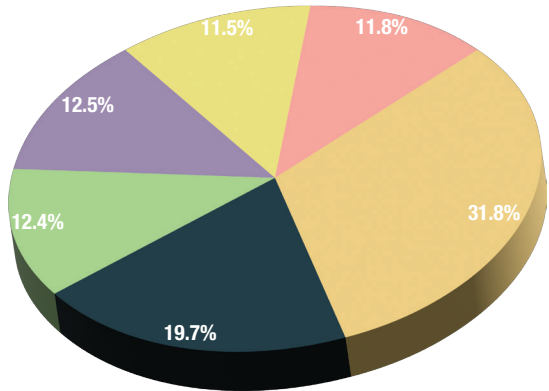
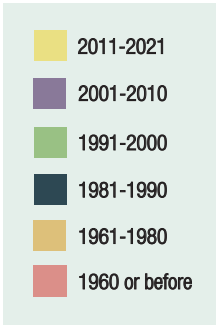
Age Distribution

In Canada, housing is considered unaffordable if it costs more than 30% of a household's before-tax income.

Average monthly payments

2016: \$1,236

2021: \$1,492

In 2016, 19% of owner households were spending 30% or more of their income on (unaffordable) shelter costs. In 2021, the percentage of people with unaffordable payments lowered to 20%.

Rented Dwellings

2016: \$875

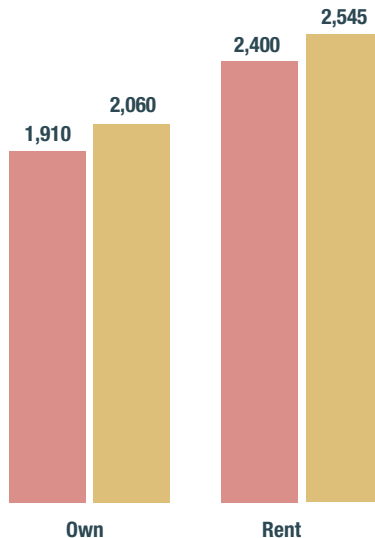
2021: \$1,159

In 2016, 49% of tenant households were spending 30% or more of their income on (unaffordable) shelter costs. In 2021, the percentage of people with unaffordable rent rose to 38%.

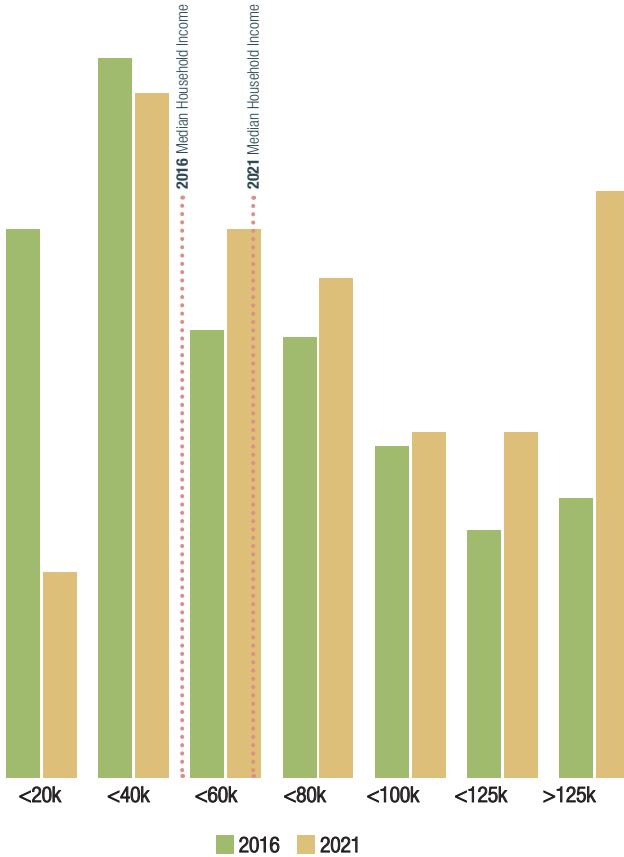

Since 2016, household incomes have risen by approximately 31%.



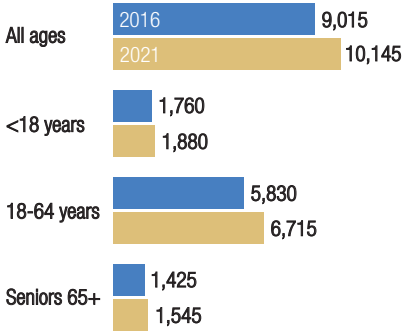
Median Individual Income

Total low-income residents (after tax)

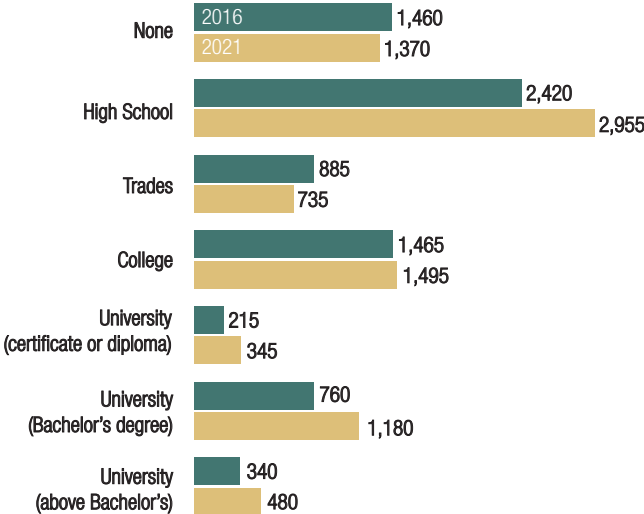


Low-Income definition

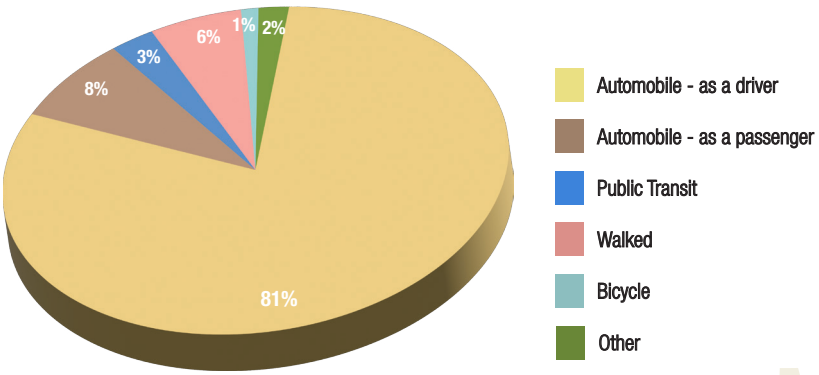
A household is considered “low income” if its total after-tax income is 50% of the median for households in Canada, adjusted for size.

Education

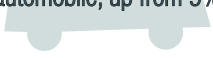
The amount of people who have higher education has remained consistent since 2016.

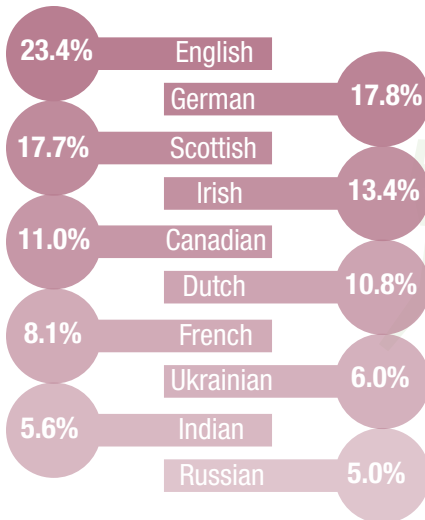

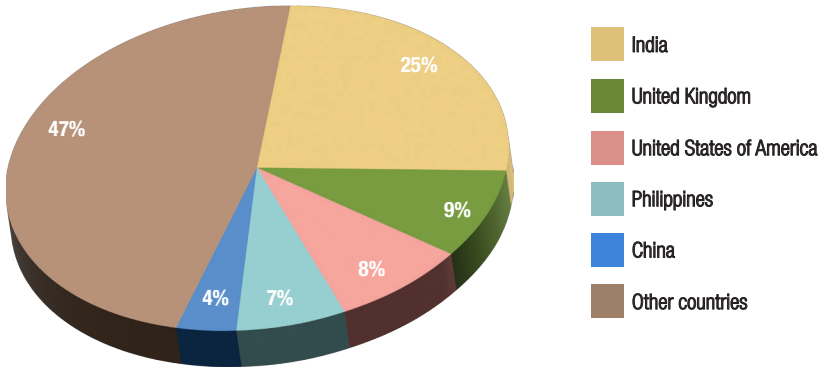


20.8% of Historic Downtown residents are of a visible minority group.
