

Sumas Mountain

Sumas Mountain is located in east Abbotsford and covers approximately 35 km². Much of this area is natural environment, with some rural residential areas, agricultural uses, and mining activity. Most of the neighbourhood is regulated by the Sumas Mountain Rural Land Use Bylaw (Area H), which is unique to this part of the City. Sumas Regional Park attracts many outdoor enthusiasts.








Family Structure




Age Distribution



Rented Dwellings





Since 2016, household incomes have lowered by approximately 8%.




Median Individual Income


Total low-income residents (after tax)




A household is considered "low income" if its total after-tax income is 50% of the median for households in Canada, adjusted for size.


